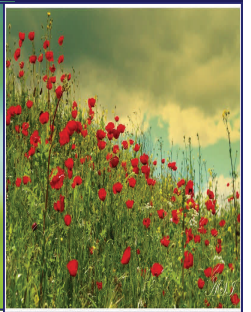

Spring Cleaning Safety

With the beginning of spring comes lots of cleaning. Is it a built in time clock on us or does the weather changing give us extra energy? Whatever it is, this time of year everyone gets into the Spring Cleaning or Deep Cleaning Mode at home & work. This month's safety topic are helpful hints that will help you make it to summer with No accidents, scrapes, burns or bruises to be in perfect shape for the beach, boating, or whatever summer activities you enjoy. Most of the time spring cleaning involves the following items: Moving or lifting heavy furniture, equipment, etc..., Handling many different chemicals and cleaners & moving objects that have been piled up or stored for at least a year. When moving or lifting heavy items at work or at home

always ask for help or use a dolly, or forklift if possible. If you are lifting alone always remember your heavy lifting training and wear a back brace if possible. Bend with your knees not your back and use slow and smooth movements. Avoid hurried, jerky movements that can strain muscles in your back or neck. Make sure your path is clear and that you are not walking on slippery, uneven surfaces.



When handling and using chemicals or cleaners always read the labels and wear proper personal protective equipment. Avoid mixing and do not pour down the drain. When mixed, cleaners like bleach and ammonia will release

toxic gases, while mixing others could cause them to ignite or explode. Most importantly if you have children and/or pets always be sure to put the cleaners back in a safe place, out of reach, when finished and that all cleaned surfaces are dry and aired out before bringing children or pets back into the area being cleaned. The main thing you need to be careful of when moving things that have been piled up or stored for long periods of time are sharp objects you have forgotten were there and/or animals/rodents that may have chosen these piled up items as a shelter or home over the winter. Simple use of caution during your day is the best way to prevent accidents.

Letter from Pastor Don



A wealthy American traveler tells the story of how he was visiting a hospital in Southeast Asia. He entered just as a young missionary nurse was cleaning the sores of a sick, dirty, elderly man who had been lying in a gutter. The wealthy man said to the nurse, “I wouldn’t do that for a million dollars.” She answered quietly and firmly, “Neither would I.”

The greatest act of the human heart is found in serving another human being. To meet another's needs over our own needs is to mirror the image of our Lord Jesus Christ. John Chapter 13 tells the story of Jesus washing the Disciples feet just hours before He was going to be crucified. The physical act was actually a spiritual picture.

- 3) Physically Jesus didn't come to "act as God", Spiritually showing Jesus came to "act as man indwelt by God."
- 4) Physically Jesus "girded himself with a towel," Spiritually showing Jesus "took on the form of a servant."
- 5) Physically Jesus "took the form of a slave & humbled Himself" Spiritually showing Jesus "humbled Himself and became obedient unto death."
- 6) Physically, Jesus "poured water into a basin," Spiritually showing He poured out His own blood in death for the washing away of our sins & guilt."
- 7) Physically, Jesus "washed the Disciples feet and wiped them with the towel which He was girded," Spiritually showing "the very act of applying the cleansing of His own blood to human lives and wrapping us up with the clothing of His own righteousness."

He took the bowl, he took the towel, He took the water and He washed their feet. He took the beatings, He took the cross and He took the pain. Then He gave us His life, His mercy, His grace, His righteousness and made us members of His family!

Praise God for His wonderful gift of serving us, even to His own death. Let's be found faithful serving Him in return by acts of serving others above ourselves.

The SVP small box enclosure come with a variety of options depending on the size of the enclosure . Some are secured by 2 quarter turns with key and others a hasp locking unit. They are all sealed with 13/16” aluminum filled gaskets. And they have 7 vents on the top and 7 vents on the bottom of the door. They all have a removable Aluminum Back Plate and top & bottom mounting Tabs as shown in picture. The optional fan and heater that are shown in the picture can be purchased by requesting an OSVP. **(Please note the SVP is enclosure only)** As an added option you can also choose from a removable aluminum back plate or a plywood back plate.
